


Political Career

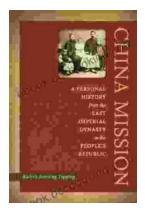


